NOTE: A basic system is a system that has all of the following functionalities: patient history and demographics, patient problem lists, physician clinical notes, comprehensive list of patients' medications and allergies, computerized orders for prescriptions, and ability to view laboratory and imaging results electronically. Having a certified system was defined by physicians answering "yes" to having a current system that "meets meaningful use criteria defined by the Department of Health and Human Services."
